The earliest Swiss postage stamp issues were cantonal like the famous Basler Dyybli (Basel Pigeon) and regional (Rayons). The first federal issues displayed only numbers and the Swiss Cross, but then, in 1854, came the famous picture series featuring the officially named "Unperforated Sitting Helvetia" that was valid until 1863. The label was not HELVETIA, but FRANCO, so only from the cross on her shield you could know that this was a Swiss stamp. Not the figure was unperforated, but the sheet, from which you had to cut the individual stamps with scissors; a stamp cut in half was also good for 5 Rappen/ centimes/ centesimi. That is why the ugly black stripes of the rhombusshaped cancellation stamp always tried to cover the entire beautiful picture, except in this rare example where a unique feature is clearly visible that gave the nick name to these stamps.



Quiz: What is the nick name of this series of stamps?

What is the feature on the stamp that led to this name, and what is the meaning of the name? Since these are three questions, here is a hint (to be fair or further confuse you): the name has something to do with a famous children's book of that time.

Obviously not owning any of these precious old stamps, I can only offer as a prize a much later, "Perforated Sitting Helvetia with Sword" that has a cancellation mark from Baden, Switzerland 99 years ago. Answer to the May Quiz:

The 1909 version of the Tellenbuebli has the string in in front of the shaft of the cross-bow (nicely visible in the picture on the right despite the large cancellation imprint). If you would lift that cross-bow and point it forward from the presenting position into a shooting position, then that string would face the floor and an arrow would fall or shoot onto your foot. Upon request of shooters and philatelists, the design was changed and all later editions had the string behind the shaft, facing the boy, and making the front string edition the rare one.

By the way, the 2 cent postage was only for printed matter in a 1.5 kilometer (about a mile) radius; the lightest regular letter for this distance was 2 ½ cents. Yes, there were 2 ½ cent Tellenbuebli, and you always had to buy 2 of them, since not even in frugal Switzerland a one cent coin could be split in half. Why they later also issued a 7 ½ cent stamp is beyond my comprehension, however. And the overprints are even more mysterious: when they changed postal rates and still had a big stock of old value stamps, they simply printed a new value over the old number on the Tellenbuebli. So I have a 3 printed over a 2 ½ cent value, which makes sense, but also a 2 ½ printed over a 3 cent stamp, which makes no sense whatsoever but is part of the fun collecting stamps. How much more there is to it you can see in the Smithsonian National Post Museum, on 2 Massachusetts Ave NE next to the Union Station (Metro red line Union Station).
